Campaign Talking Points

What?

- Starts with One is a statewide campaign developed to prevent opioid misuse before it starts and
 raise awareness about how and where to safely dispose of unwanted, unused or expired opioids
 and the importance of removing prescription opioid medications from homes.
- Opioids are a type of pain medication that can be highly addictive. Examples are oxycodone (OxyContin[®]), hydrocodone (Vicodin[®]), codeine, morphine, and others.¹
- The illegal drug heroin is also an opioid.

Why?

Protect loved ones

- Opioids are now one of the leading causes of injury-related deaths in Washington State.
 More people die from overdose than from car crashes.²
- 75 percent of opioid misuse starts with people using medication that wasn't prescribed for them — usually taken from a friend or family member.³
- Between 2012 and 2016, more than 3,300 lives in Washington were lost to overdose from opioids.²
- Promptly removing leftover opioid prescriptions from your home and safely disposing of your medications at a dropbox kiosk helps prevent misuse by a friend, family member or other home visitor and reduces the risk of deadly overdose.

Protect the environment

- Safe disposal not only helps prevent misuse and overdose deaths, it's also important for the health of our environment.
- Scientists have found medicines in Pacific Northwest water and soils.⁴ Even at low levels, these medicines can harm the health of wildlife and drinking water.
- Drop box kiosks or mail-back envelopes are the only environmentally safe way to dispose of old or unused opioid medications.

How/Where?

- There are a few ways to safely dispose of opioids:
 - 1. Drop them at a permanent take back location.
 - o Attend a National Prescription Drug Take Back Day in your community.
 - 2. Now, drop box kiosks are also conveniently located at retail pharmacies, police stations, health centers and other community sites year-round.
 - 3. You can request a free medication return envelope online at MED-Project.org and safely mail back your leftover medications.
- DEA National Prescription Drug Take Back Day events are held every year in April and October, in communities across the state.
 - o All prescription medications are accepted during Prescription Drug Take Back Day events.
